

A Capital Campaign for the Ronald McDonald House at Stony Brook

Our Story

Located in New Hyde Park on the campus of the Steven and Alexandra Cohen Children's Medical Center, the Ronald McDonald House of Long Island provides vital resources and compassionate care to children and their families in a warm and supportive environment.

Since 1986, Ronald McDonald House of Long Island has helped tens of thousands of families with sick children find comfort and support when they need it most. Our programs, tailored to meet the urgent needs of our community, make a difference in the lives of families with critically ill children.

Many families travel far from home and spend several weeks or months getting treatment for their seriously ill or injured children — a long time to be away or to divide a family. For children facing a serious medical crisis, nothing seems scarier than not having mom and dad close by for love and support. The Ronald McDonald House provides a place for families to call home so they can stay close to their hospitalized child at little or at no cost.

Over the last 35 years, Ronald McDonald House of Long Island has served over 45,000 families in the United States, and from more than 80 countries around the world who are dealing with the pain of having a child undergo medical treatment at nearby hospitals.

To better respond to the evolving needs of families facing the medical uncertainty and financial stress of caring for a sick child, Ronald McDonald House Charities New York Tri State (RMHC Tri State) and Ronald McDonald House of Long Island have merged to become Ronald McDonald House Charities New York Metro (RMHC New York Metro). The new organization will provide accommodation and a community of compassionate care, support and vital resources to over 6,000 families with sick children in 2021.










Keeping Families Close Across All of Long Island

RMHC New York Metro has seen the need for its services grow and has expanded its mission to serve more of Suffolk County. With 104 beds and more than 180 pediatric specialists, Stony Brook Children's Hospital is Suffolk County's only children's hospital. More than 8,000 children and young adults are discharged each year.

A Ronald McDonald Family Room was built at Stony Brook Children's in 2013. In 2021, the Ronald McDonald Family Room at Stony Brook Children's served 1,077 families and 2,599 individuals. Realizing the need was great, we partnered with Stony Brook Children's in 2022 to add a second Ronald McDonald Family Room, doubling the number of families we could serve.







Supporting Suffolk County

- Average of 3,500 families per year at Stony Brook Children's Hospital with one Family Room and a second Family Room in 2022

Making a Difference

Our small presence in Stony Brook makes a significant difference. When families walk into one of our Ronald McDonald Family Rooms, we want them to forget they're in a hospital. Closely located near the pediatric intensive care unit, our Ronald McDonald Family Rooms offer a place to rest and regroup right at the hospital, just steps away from their sick child. Research shows that staying close by allows parents to better communicate with their child's medical team and improves adherence to complicated treatment plans.

A recent study published in Families, Systems and Health, a journal of the American Psychological Association, finds that families who stayed together at a Ronald McDonald House, for even a portion of their seriously-ill child's hospital stay, believed their ability to stay nearby helped their child recover and spend less time in the hospital.

OUR FAMILIES

Sophia's Story

"This time last year, my daughter Sophia was in the intensive care unit with Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV), a respiratory virus that infects the lungs and breathing passages. Leaving her bedside was not an option. My husband could only come to the hospital at night, as he was working long hours to make ends meet.

Each day at the hospital felt like an eternity, staring at the bare institutionalized walls of my baby's room. One of the gracious nurses told me about the Ronald McDonald Family Room. When I stepped inside, I felt like I was at home for a moment. The holiday

decorations and bright lights lifted my spirits. There was a lounge area with comfortable couches and kitchen tables. It felt so warm and welcoming. There were showers to freshen up and a place to do laundry. The fully-stocked kitchen with access to snacks and beverages was so helpful, as it was a fortune to use the hospital cafeteria.

My beautiful baby Sophia gave me another miracle on December 24, when she was discharged. She was able to spend what was left of the holiday season with our family at home where she belonged."

"My son Kyle, who is now 7 years old experienced alarming symptoms such as sleep apnea and snoring at a very young age. It wasn't until after visiting multiple doctors that an ENT at Cohen Children's Medical Center of New York diagnosed Kyle with a tumor in his nasopharynx this past summer.

After much anxiety and sleepless nights, Kyle's surgery was successful, and his doctor was cautiously optimistic. We were relieved when Kyle slept through the night for the first time in almost a year!


Just as we thought we were on our way back to a normal life, we received the dreaded call to meet with a pediatric oncologist and hospital social worker. The greatest fear we could ever imagine became a reality. Kyle's tumor was cancerous. Kyle had to begin chemotherapy immediately. It felt like someone ripped my heart out.


Commuting from the east end of Long Island to the hospital during rush hour was an absolute nightmare, especially with bouts of nausea. The hospital staff told us about the RMHCNYM, just a two-minute walk from the hospital! Since we would be in and out of the hospital for chemotherapy for the following several weeks, they suggested this haven so that we could focus solely on Kyle's recovery.

When we stay at the House, our troubles somehow seem to disappear for a short time. Ronald McDonald House Charities New York Metro provides a network of hope — a support system that offers a place for healing when our world is falling apart."


